

# Special Report of Repeated Baker Act Examinations of Children with Special Emphasis on Department of Children and Families Districts

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## INTRODUCTION

Baker Act examinations are involuntary examinations of up to 72-hours that are conducted at Baker Act receiving facilities. Statutory language in F.S. section 394.463 requires Baker Act receiving facilities to send a form documenting each involuntary examination to the Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA) within one business day. However, by way of agreement with the Agency, these forms are submitted to the Baker Act Reporting Center at the Louis de la Parte Florida Mental Health Institute from all designated Baker Act receiving facilities statewide. The primary purpose of this report is to present information about involuntary examinations experienced by children and youth (ages 5-17) in the various Districts/Regions of the Department of Children and Families.

## DATA USE

The Baker Act data used for the analyses presented in this report allow us to address some important questions. However, it is important to understand how the data can be used and their limitations. There are technical nuances to the three county data elements in the Baker Act data that are important to consider when interpreting the analyses presented in this report.

### ***1. County of Initiation***

The county in which the Baker Act examination was initiated, may be different from the county where the Baker Act receiving facility at which the individual is examined is located.

### ***2. County of Facility***

The county in which the Baker Act receiving facility is located.

### ***3. County of the Individual Examined***

The county of residence of the person who is examined (from the cover sheet).

In many cases, the county of initiation, the county where the receiving facility is located, and the county of residence for the person being examined are all the same. Our experience is that the county used for many analyses does not typically affect the results significantly. However, there may be circumstances in which the county used in the analysis does make a difference in the results. For example, conducting analyses of repeated exams by geographic units, by county or district presents some analytical difficulties. The goal of this discussion is to clarify the limitations of analyses of repeated Baker Act examinations by geographic area and how this affects interpretation of results.

County of residence information is missing disproportionately from certain facilities, primarily because it is not completed on the cover sheet submitted or no cover sheet is submitted with certain forms. This means that although for many analyses the county of residence is the preferred variable on a conceptual level, on a practical level it can result in misleading numbers. Differences in the number of exams as determined by a) county of residence and b) county of facility may mean that facilities in this county receive children from other counties. However, it may also mean that one or more facilities in this county failed to complete the county of residence field on the cover sheet. Due to the volume of data received in the Baker Act Reporting Center and the limitations of the current funding for work with the data, data entry staff are instructed to enter county of residence as it appears on the cover sheet submitted with each form. For example, if there is a Tampa address, but no county of residence indicated, county of residence will be entered as missing. While the county is obvious in this example, it becomes less obvious in other instances. Changes were made to the cover sheet from which this data element is taken effective April 2005 in an effort to increase data quality for county of residence and other data elements.

## CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

Some contextual information about children’s crisis services will help with the interpretation of results. Receiving facilities are licensed by the AHCA, but are designated as receiving facilities by the Florida Department of Children and Families (DCF). Publicly funded receiving facilities are those that receive public funds (i.e., funds from DCF) for Baker Act examinations. Most of the publicly funded receiving facilities are part of larger community mental health centers and are called “crisis stabilization units” or CSUs. However, there are a few hospitals that receive public funds, but they are not referred to as CSUs. In addition, there are private receiving facilities that receive no public funds for these services.

Florida has 11 publicly funded receiving facilities with designated children’s units located in ten counties, within five districts/regions (Districts 4, 7, 8, 11, and the Suncoast Region)(see Table 1). All eleven are part of larger community mental health centers. There is also a private hospital that is designated as a receiving facility and that only cares for children (Miami Children’s Hospital). Nine DCF Districts (1, 2, 3, 9, 10, 12, 13, 14, and 15) have no publicly funded crisis stabilization units that are specifically designated for children.

The Baker Act does not require that children only be examined in these CSUs. In fact, the Baker Act specifies that people (adults and children) are to be taken to the nearest receiving facility. The nearest receiving facility may not be one of these ten receiving facilities listed in Table 1. The implications for the number and location of these units will be discussed later.

## Method

Statewide Baker Act data for involuntary examinations initiated between 2002 through most of 2004 were used for these analyses.<sup>1</sup> Any form with the same social security number and the same date as another form or a date within three days of another was identified as a duplicate and taken out of the analyses. This is based on our experience that these likely represent transfers, rather than new episodes. Approximately four percent of forms were identified as duplicates and not included in analyses.

During this time period there were 302,039 total examinations (adults and children) statewide, with 49,824 (16%) exams for children age 5 through 17 at the time of the examination. The 2004 Florida population was estimated at 17,514,157, with an estimated 2,854,502 (16%) from ages 5 to 17.<sup>2</sup>

There were 190,083 individuals identified as having experienced an examination, with 30,309 (16%) of them age 5 through 17 having at least one examination during the time period. The county of residence was known for 38,267 of the 49,824 exams of children. Because the county of residence is only known for 77% of the examinations, this leads to an underestimate of examinations when categorized by county (and therefore district/region because the county variable is used to categorize into districts/regions). There were 7,201 (14%) forms for exams of children that were missing the child's social security number. This means that the number of children who had one or more examinations is underestimated, because the number of examinations is determined by counting the number of exams for each social security number).

Children had between 1 and 29 exams during the almost three year time period, with 6,278 (21%) having more than one examination (Table 2). While children with more than one exam accounted for 21% of the children with exams, their examinations accounted for 44% of the examinations.

Information about the dates and places of examination for the 10 children with 15 or more examinations over the almost three year period is presented in Appendix A. Five of these ten children with large numbers of examinations had their examinations primarily in the Suncoast Region.

The number of examinations based on the child's county of residence (as reported on the Cover Sheet provided with each form) and the county of facility are provided in Table 3. Population statistics are also provided to put these numbers into context. It is important to keep in mind when reading Table 3 that the number of children examined in each county is less than the number of exams for children in each county because some children have multiple examinations. However, due to the difficulty of categorizing children with multiple exams in multiple counties the count of children in each county is difficult to generate and can be misleading. Therefore, these counts have not been generated for this report. For example, if a child had 2 exams in Dade, 4 in Palm Beach and 1 in Monroe Counties counting the child in each county would lead to inaccurately inflated numbers.

#### ANALYSIS OF REPEATED EXAMINATIONS

This analysis of children with multiple Baker Act examinations was conducted in response to a request to generate DCF District/Region level figures. It is important to stress that this report and others from the Baker Act Reporting Center are typically generated for a specific purpose and may not be appropriate for other uses. Rather, a fresh analysis of the data may be needed dependent on the purposes. Some helpful concepts for the use of data like these are presented in Appendix B.

There are challenges present in analyzing children's Baker Act data by District because some children have exams while in different districts. Over the almost three year period (January 2002-mid November 2004) there were 504 (1.7%) children with examinations in two different districts, 22 with exams in three districts and one with exams in 4 districts. For purposes of these analyses, the data for these children were assigned to the district in which they had the most exams (see Table A in Appendix C). Three children were not assigned a district and, therefore, were not included in these analyses because they had an even number of exams in each district. (Excluding the three children did not affect the overall results.) One district was randomly chosen for the 504 children with examinations in two districts. This avoids the problem of data from a child appearing in more than one district (so appearing in the data as more than one child) and also allows for a more accurate count of the number of repeated exams (because they are not divided up across districts).

Repeated Exams by District/Region are presented in Table 4.

## DISCUSSION

There is a group of children that experience multiple examinations. While there is variation in the number of children with multiple examinations in each district, when these numbers are put into the context of the number of children in each district/region this variation is logical. That is, it is positively related to the number of children in each district/region. There is variability in the percentage of children with exams who have two or more exams, ranging from 25% in the Suncoast Region to 17% in District 1. Key to interpreting these results is that some of the districts/regions with higher percentages of children with two or more exams and with higher number of examinations are the districts/regions that a) have higher populations of children and b) have on or more children's CSUs. Of particular note is that the Suncoast Region, with 25% of children with exams having two or more exams, has a) the highest population of children of any district/region in the state and b) has more children's CSUs than any other district/region. Having made this point however, it is also important to understand that this relationship of high numbers of children and/or the existence of children's CSUs to higher number of exams and/or higher percentages of repeated examinations is not a perfect one. These are, however, important factors to consider when determining how to interpret these results.

While additional research is needed to empirically investigate this point, it is logical to suppose that communities, or at least certain communities, that have a children's crisis unit see these units as a resource. This may lead to law enforcement, schools, mental health professionals, and other entities to initiate Baker Act examinations because the children's CSU is seen as a resource for that community. Communities that do not have crisis units specifically for children may use other resources in the community in lieu of Baker Act examination. The implications this concept may have on policy are numerous, but cannot be addressed without additional research. That is, investigating these ideas is not possible just using the Baker Act data. Having a children's crisis unit in a community may be positive in that children have access to crisis services when they need them, aiding the children and their families toward more positive outcomes (such as better functioning, less involvement with juvenile justice, etc.). It may lead to the identification of children most in need of crisis services. However, there is also the possibility that having a children's crisis unit in a community may mean that alternatives to Baker Act examinations may not be developed or used. To the extent that these are important policy issues, these concepts are worthy of additional consideration and study.

## Appendix A

Following is basic information about the dates and places of examinations for the ten children with the most examinations over the three years (Table A). These ten children are all of the children with more than 15 examinations in the almost three year period.

## Appendix B

### Notes About Responsible Data Use<sup>11</sup>

- Analyzing data trends – definitions, formulae, and methodology often change while the name of the variable does not
- Determine size of universe or sample – rates and ratios based on small numbers can be misleading
- Note the time frame of data – calendar year, fiscal year, or specific points in time
- Recognize content relationships between variables
- Stating outcomes and conclusions – claiming credit, casting blame, or identifying program success can be misleading without experimental evidence
- Utilize precise definitions – variables may appear similar but have distinct differences
- Clearly label all graphic presentation
- Determine effects of unusual or historical events
- Note sources of data – original reporting source, secondary source
- Remember, this data represents our children and families and may affect decisions about their lives

When interpreting these findings, it is important to put them into context, such as the population statistics included later in this report. The strengths and limitations of the data as described in this report should also be considered when interpreting these results.
